



Attestation Form For COVID-19 3rd Dose for Immunocompromised People

This form is for people who have a moderately to severely weakened immune system who have already received 2 doses of Pfizer or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine.

If you meet the criteria outlined by the CDC, it is recommended that you get a 3rd dose of an mRNA (Pfizer or Moderna) vaccine, depending on the brand received previously, at least 28 days after your 2nd dose of vaccine. Talk to your doctor about the need to get a 3rd dose of COVID-19 vaccine and the best timing of a 3rd dose.

I attest that I am immunocompromised and am eligible for a third dose of vaccine based on the criteria below.

- Receiving active cancer treatment for tumors or cancers of the blood;
- Received an organ transplant and am taking medicine to suppress my immune system;
- Received a stem cell transplant within the last 2 years or am taking medicine to suppress the immune system;
- Moderate or severe primary immunodeficiency (such as DiGeorge syndrome, WiskottAldrich syndrome);
- Advanced or untreated HIV infection;
- Active treatment with high-dose corticosteroids or other drugs that suppress my immune response.
i.e., ≥ 20 mg prednisone or equivalent per day, alkylating agents, antimetabolites, transplant-related immunosuppressive drugs, cancer chemotherapeutic agents classified as severely immunosuppressive, TNF blockers, and other biologic agents that are immunosuppressive or immunomodulatory.

It is important to continue to protect yourself after you get a 3rd dose of the vaccine. This includes wearing a well-fitting mask, maintaining physical distance, avoiding crowded places or spaces with poor air flow, and washing hands often. Consider “double masking” (wearing a cloth face mask over surgical mask) or an N95 respirator for a higher level of protection.
